#### What Is a Health Disparity?

The CDC defines a health disparity as a preventable difference in the burden of disease, injury and violence (Center for Disease Control and Prevention, 2018). In addition, disparities are involved with access to adequate health care due to social status, gender or race/ethnicity (Center for Disease Control and Prevention, 2018). Health disparities can also be defined as differences in incidence, prevalence, mortality and disease burden that exist amongst different populations in the United States (American Psychological Association, 2018). The American Psychological Association also identifies health disparities as a difference in health outcomes as a result of unnecessary and avoidable issues due to social and economic status (American Psychological Association, 2018).





#### Life Expectancy by Race/Ethnicity and Sex in NJ 2018






#### Age-Adjusted Death Rate by Race/Ethnicity NJ 2018




# RUTGERS Infant Mortality Rate by Mother's Race/Ethnicity, NJ 2000 -17





#### RUTGERS Mortality Rate among Children 1 - 4 years Old by Race/Ethnicity New Jersey, 2000 - 2017









# Mortality Rate among Children 5-14 years Old by Race/Ethnicity New Jersey, 2000 - 2017





#### Children < 5 Years of Age Living in Poverty in NJ 2014-18















#### Percentage of Trenton Families Living Below the Poverty Level, 2017










% of NPS Students Chronically Absent, 2018-19





Who was Freddie Gray? How did he die? And what led to the mistrial in Baltimore?

Gray, 25, grew up in the impoverished neighborhood of Sandtown-Winchester on Baltimore's west side.

In 2008, a lead-paint lawsuit was filed on behalf of Gray and two of his sisters against the owners of the home in which they grew up. Court papers described his difficult upbringing: a disabled mother addicted to heroin who, in a deposition, said she could not read; walls and windowsills containing enough lead to poison the children and leave them incapable of leading functional lives; a young man who was four grade levels behind in reading.





# Traumatic Experiences Widespread Among U.S. Youth, New Data Show

October 19, 2017

Nationally, more than **46 percent** of U.S. youth—34 million children under age 18—have had at least one ACE, and **more than 20 percent have had at least two.** 

The new analysis includes state-by-state percentages of children with ACEs, ranging from 38.1 percent in Minnesota to 55.9 percent in Arkansas. The ten states with the highest rates are either in the South or West.

ACEs are more prevalent among children in low-income families—62 percent of children with family incomes under 200 percent of the federal poverty level have had at least one ACEs. But they occur among children at all income levels—26 percent of children in families with incomes higher than 400 percent of the federal poverty level have had one or more ACEs as well.

White children are less likely to have ACEs than Hispanic or black children, but they make up the plurality of all children who have had ACEs.

40 percent of white children have one or more ACEs, 51 percent of Hispanic children have one or more ACEs 64 percent of black children have one or more ACEs.

46 percent of children who have had one or more ACEs are white,

27 percent are Hispanic

17 percent are black.

The ACEs assessed in the survey are:

Somewhat often/very often hard to get by on income

Parent/guardian divorced or separated

Parent/guardian died

Parent/guardian served time in jail

Saw or heard violence in the home

The ACEs assessed in the survey are:

Victim of violence or witness violence in neighborhood

Lived with anyone mentally ill, suicidal, or depressed

Lived with anyone with alcohol or drug problem

Often treated or judged unfairly due to race/ethnicity

"The pathophysiology of toxic stress consists of frequent, unremitting activation of the hypothalamic-pituitary-adrenocortical (HPA) axis stress system and chronic elevation of cortisol as well as inflammatory mediators."



"...the epigenetic, anatomic, and neuroendocrine disruption related to chronic toxic stress may impair learning, behavior, and interpersonal relationships."



"The combination of impaired selfregulation and chronic stress may lead
to maladaptive behaviors, such as
smoking, excessive alcohol intake,
overeating, promiscuity, and substance
abuse that transiently turn off the stress
response but over the life course may
cause morbidity and early mortality."



"Within families, poverty is associated with intimate partner violence, maternal depression, single-parent families, and parental substance abuse, all of which are risk factors for child maltreatment."



### **Deaths by Race and Hispanic Origin, Ages 0-18 Years**







# Fig 2. Cumulative Number of Child COVID-19 Cases: 10/29/20







